PRIMARY AND SECONDARY SOURCES

Primary Sources – are the raw materials of history — original **documents** and objects which were created at the time under study. They are different from secondary **sources**, accounts or interpretations of events created by someone without firsthand experience. *examples: letters, diaries, photographs, artifacts*

Secondary Sources – any **source** about an event, period, or issue in history that was produced after that event, period or issue has passed. *examples: textbooks, essays and biographies*
