## **Dump and Clump--Indus Valley**

- Cut vocabulary cards into individual pieces
- At your table group, DISCUSS the relationships between words
- Group words into 4-5 different categories based on similar factors or characteristics
- You should title each category **creatively** 
  - This does not work if categories are basic like "people" or "places"
  - Have deep dialogue about the words to really consider how the words overlap and relate
  - <u>Example</u>: enlighten, gurus, and karma could be in a category called *beliefs/practices of religion* as all of these things are related to the belief systems of the Indus Valley people

karma	Hinduism
The effect of a person's actions in this and in previous lives	The main religion of India for the past 2000 years; one of the oldest religions in the world; polytheistic
Buddhism	Sanskrit
A world religion that began on the Indian subcontinent; spread to many faraway lands	The 1st language of Ancient India; allowed them keep records
subcontinent	enlightenment
A large landmass that is set apart from the rest of the continent	A state of perfect wisdom
Vedas	migrate
A collection of sacred hymns (religious songs) and other ancient texts; composed by the Aryans; written between 1500BC and 1000BC	To move from one region to another in order to live there
caste system	Brahmanism
The social hierarchy of India created by the Aryans that divided Indian society into groups based on a person's birth, wealth, or occupation	A religion based on priests and rituals, particularly sacrifices to the gods; the religion of the Vedic Age
gurus	Aryans
Teachers and thinkers who left their homes to live in the forest, to think, and to talk about religious ideas	A nomadic group invaded India and took control; they introduced a new religion and a new social structure; Aryans means "the noble ones"
widespread	Siddhartha Gautama
Common; spread across a large area	An Hindu prince who was an Indian spiritual leader; became known as Buddha; founded Buddhism
