Jewish Leaders:

Person	Role
Abraham	God promised that his descendants would always control Canaan (Promised Land); God made a COVENANT (binding agreement and relationship) with Abraham; lived in Ur in Mesopotamia; traveled by Euphrates River to get to Canaan; considered a Patriarch of Jewish faith
Isaac	Abraham's son; considered a Patriarch of Jewish faith
Jacob	He was Abraham's grandson; his 12 sons became leaders for the Twelve Tribes of Israel; one of his son's was Joseph (sold into slavery by his brothers; became advisor to Pharaoh in Egypt; interpreted dreams; forgave his family and helped them during widespread famine); considered a Patriarch of Jewish faith
Moses	Led the Israelites out of slavery in Egyptthis escape from slavery is called the Exodus; received the Ten Commandments from God; the commandments are carried in a case called the Ark of the Covenant
Joshua	Led Israelites into the Promised Land (called Canaan) and became leader of Israelites after Moses died; conquered the city of Jericho and several other kingdoms in Canaan
Saul	"After Joshua died, the Israelites remained a group of tribes without a common governmentIn times of distress, the Israelites often rallied around leaders called judgesa judge was a leader who could rally the Israelites to defend their landthe time of the judges ended when the warrior Saul became the 1st king of Israel." (pg 182-183 in textbook)
	Saul became 1st king of Israel (a united kingdom)
David	Young shepherd and musician; one of Saul's best warriors; became King of Israel around 1000BC; captured Jerusalem, made it the capital of Israel; extended the kingdom
Solomon	David's son; became King of Israel after David; ordered the creation of the 1st Temple of Jerusalem; very wise and respected leader; unified kingdom doesn't last long after Solomon dies

Jewish Timeline:

1700 BC (about) -- God speaks to Abraham

1200 BC (about) -- The Exodus is believed to have occurred during the 1200s

1000 BC (about) -- the 1st Kingdom of Israel begins, and the 1st Temple is built

900 BC (about) -- Israel splits into two kingdoms named Israel (northern part) and Judah (southern part)

722 BC (about) -- Assyrians conquered Israel

587 BC (about)-- Babylonians and their ruler Nebuchadnezzar conquered Judah, exiled the people of Israel to Babylon, destroyed the 1st Temple (beginning of Babylonian Exile)

538 BC -- Cyrus the Great of Persia conquers Babylon and allows Jews to return to Judah; Many Jews did return to Judah, but some did not

515 BC -- Jewish leaders build the 2nd Temple

70 AD -- Romans destroy 2nd Temple; many Jewish people leave the region
